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FALL 1999 ENROLLMENT SUMMARY

The following report summarizes the status and trends in fall enrollment at the University of Missouri's four campuses. Enrollments are presented in a series of six tables. The first table summarizes the fall total headcount enrollments for each campus and the System since 1995. The second table displays fall 1999 enrollments by campus, student level, and characteristics such as residency, full- and part-time status, and student full-time equivalency. Following the first two summary tables are a series of tables displaying more detailed enrollment and student characteristics for the System and each individual campus. Tables 3.0-3.4 depict on-campus and off-campus headcount and full-time equivalency enrollments as well as student credit hours by student level. On-campus and off-campus enrollments by residency, full- and part-time status, and student level are shown in Tables 4.0-4.4. Table 5.0 shows enrollments by student level, gender, and ethnic characteristics, and Table 6.0 displays UMKC headcount enrollment in its six-year dentistry and medicine programs.

Technical Notes

These tables provide counts of students enrolled in the fall 1999 on-schedule credit courses of the four campuses of the University of Missouri. Fall 1998 counts are included in the Table 3 series (3.0-3.4) for comparison purposes. The data included in these tables were prepared in the admissions and registration offices at the respective campuses. The data are counts as of the census data at each campus, which is defined as the end of the fourth week of classes for the fall session. The reports were generally based on the reporting guidelines and definitions of the Coordinating Board for Higher Education (CBHE) and the National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES).

Each of the tables in the Table 3 and Table 4 series include counts of on- and off-campus students. The columns titled "On-Campus", according to the CBHE guidelines, include students enrolled geographically on campus and students in the Graduate Engineering (Residence) Centers. All other students are counted in the columns headed "Off-Campus". The tables of the Table 3 series also include full-time equivalence (FTE) counts. FTE is defined as 15 semester credit hours for undergraduates and 12 semester credit hours for graduates. For professional programs, FTE is defined as 15 semester hours for Law, 18 for UM Columbia Medicine, and 16 for Veterinary Medicine. For Dentistry, UMKC Medicine, Optometry, and Pharmacy, FTE is equal to headcount.

Caveats

First- and second-year students in the Dentistry DDS and Medicine MD programs at UMKC are included in the undergraduate counts of the Table 3 and Table 4 series. For this reason, headcount enrollments for students at all years in these two programs are summarized in Table 6. Enrollment counts for students in "Off-Schedule" courses, which include intersession courses, short courses, Video Credit courses, and other courses which begin and end on dates other than those for the regular academic semester, are accumulated during the term in which the courses began and are reported the semester following their end date.

Tables 1 and 2: Fall Enrollment History and Summary of Fall 1999 Enrollments

- The University of Missouri had a total enrollment of 54,757 in fall of 1999. While the highest figure in five years, total enrollment has changed by less than 1% from 1995 through 1999.
- There is much campus variation in enrollment over the period 1995 through 1999. The Columbia campus has increased enrollment by 3% and the St Louis campus has lost 2%. The Kansas City campus has increased enrollment by 13% and the Rolla campus has lost 13%. These campuses are unequal in size and the percentages are not directly offsetting.
- Total enrollments at UM-Columbia and UM-Kansas City have increased each of the last five years, while UM-Rolla's total enrollment has declined each of the last five years. Total enrollment at UM-

- Total headcount enrollment at the University increased 1% from 54,349 in fall 1998 to 54,757 in fall 1999.
- Undergraduate enrollment increased by 1% and first professional enrollments each increased 3% over fall 1998. Graduate enrollment increased by 1%, due mainly to a decrease of 251 students (3%) at the masters level.
- A rise in off-campus nondegree seeking undergraduate and graduate students led to a 4% increase in off-campus enrollment. On-campus enrollment showed a slight increase of 1%.
- The number of first-time degree seeking freshmen enrolling at the University of Missouri increased by 358 students over fall 1997, an increase of 6%.
- First-time degree seeking graduate students totaled 1,926 or 7% less than the total in fall 1997.
- The percentage changes in FTE enrollments and SCH produced were identical: 2% and 3% increases at the undergraduate and first professional levels, respectively, and a 1% decrease at the graduate level.

- Total headcount enrollment at UM-Columbia increased 1% (150 students) from 22,780 in fall 1998 to 22,930 in fall 1999.
- In a reverse of last year's drop of 1% in freshman and sophomore enrollment, enrollment was up 160 (2%) in fall 1999. First-time freshman enrollment was also up by 2%.
- Following graduate level enrollment declines in all categories in fall of 1998, fall 1999 showed an increase at the masters and doctoral levels and a decline in nondegree seeking headcount enrollment. Expressed in SCH or FTE enrollment, the change was a significant increase of 4%.
- When all levels were combined, FTE enrollment and SCH produced each increased 1% over fall 1998.

- Total headcount enrollment at UM-Kansas City was 11,518 in fall 1999, a 9% increase over the total of 10,611 in fall 1998. FTE enrollment rose by 5% during the last year. However, the increase was primarily the result of more complete off-campus, nondegree enrollment records. The Kansas City campus has been working to more accurately reflect dual-credit enrollments and their effort is evidenced by this change.
- Undergraduate enrollment increased by 2% for on-campus students and graduate enrollment increased by 4% on campus. Most of the graduate increase was in nondegree-seeking students. There was a sharp increase of 7% in professional school enrollments reflecting a programmatic change in pharmacy that asserts the doctor of pharmacy as the base degree. This policy change should not affect future years.
- Enrollment of first-time degree seeking freshmen increased by 27 students or 4% over fall 1998.

- Total headcount enrollment at UM-Rolla decreased from 4,918 students in fall 1998 to 4,715 students in fall 1999, a decline of 4% on top of the 1% decline in 1998.
- The number of first-time degree seeking freshmen decreased 6% from fall 1998 to fall of 1999. Fall of 1998 showed an increased 4% over fall 1997.
- At the graduate level, enrollment declined 3%. Masters level enrollment was steady (+2) while doctoral enrollment

- Total headcount enrollment at UM-St. Louis was 15,594 in fall 1999, a 2% decrease from fall of 1998 but nearly the same as in 1997.
- The declines were at the undergraduate and graduate levels: -2% at the undergraduate level and -3% at the graduate level. It should be noted that on-campus undergraduate enrollment was unchanged from fall of 1998.
- Graduate level enrollment was down 3% from fall 1998 and fall 1998 was down 2% from fall 1997. Enrollment at the masters level declined by 71 students (-3%) – a decline that was very similar to that seen in 1998.
- FTE enrollment and SCH produced were very nearly unchanged from fall of 1998 to fall of 1999.
- The number of first-time degree seeking freshmen was down by 40 students in fall 1999, a loss of 6%.

- Sixty-five percent of all students enrolled at the University of Missouri are full-time students.
- Undergraduate students in the lower division have a full-time enrollment of 91%. The percentage of upper division undergraduates enrolled full-time is 74%. Overall, 71% of undergraduates are enrolled full-time.
- Ninety-seven percent of first professional students are enrolled full-time, with all students in dentistry, medicine, optometry and pharmacy enrolled full-time.
- Graduate students are the most likely group to be part-time and non-resident. Part-time students comprise 63% of the graduate student level, and 35% are non-residents.
- At the undergraduate level, 87% of students are Missouri residents. Eighty-two percent of first professional students are residents of Missouri.

- Full-time students at UM-Kansas City numbered 6,119 or 53% of the total. At the undergraduate level, 57% of students are enrolled full-time, compared to 27% at the graduate level. Once again, the

- Eighty-four percent of students at UM-Rolla are enrolled full-time. Full-time enrollment at the undergraduate level is 88%, while at the graduate level it is 67%.
- UM-Rolla has the highest percentage of non-residents among the four campuses (32%).
- Missouri residents comprise 75% of the total undergraduate enrollment, compared to only 36% at the graduate level.

- UM-St. Louis has the lowest percentage of full-time students (38%) and the highest proportion of Missouri residents (94%) among the four campuses.
- At the undergraduate level, 74% of degree seeking freshmen and sophomores are enrolled full-time, compared to 51% of degree seeking juniors and seniors. Only 17% of graduate students are enrolled full-time.
- Ninety-six percent of undergraduates at UM-St. Louis are Missouri residents, while 87% of graduate students are residents. Of the 173 first professional students, 49% are residents of Missouri.
- UM-St. Louis has a higher number of students enrolled off-campus than the other four campuses. Part-time off-campus enrollment equaled 3,492 or 22% of total enrollment.

- Total enrollment at the University of Missouri is 54% women and 46% men. UM-St. Louis has the largest percentage of women (62%) and UM-Rolla has the highest proportion of men (77%).
- The first professional level has an equal proportion of men (50%) while students at the undergraduate and graduate levels are more likely to be women (53% and 56% respectively).
- Under-represented minorities (American Indian/Alaskan Native, African-American, and Hispanic) represent 10.5% of the University of Missouri's total enrollment. UM-St. Louis enrolls the largest proportion (13.5%) followed by UM-Kansas City (13.4%), UM-Columbia (8.1%), and UM-Rolla (5.5%).
- UM-St. Louis has an African-American enrollment of 1,771 students, 11.8% of its total, and the largest percentage among the four campuses.
- UM-Kansas City enrolls higher percentages of Asian/Pacific Islanders and Hispanics, 5.9% and 3.3% respectively, than the other four campuses.
- Although nonresident aliens comprise only 5.4% of total enrollment at the University of Missouri, they represent 18.5% of the total graduate enrollment. UM-Rolla enrolls the largest percentage of nonresident alien graduate students (48.5%).
